Letter FROM THE MAYOR



hat a year this has been! As the holidays and year's end draws near, I am excited about what will take place in the new year.

Recently, we have been experiencing unusually high tides which have been attributed to the "Super Moon" and the "King Tide", both natural phenomena. On November 14, 15, and 16 of 2016, the tides were the highest. I, along with the Town Council and Town Manager, have been very concerned. We are addressing any issues regarding these recent events. Considering how high the tides were, the Town has fared very well. We will continue to monitor the situations and if you have any questions or concerns, you can direct them to Town Hall.

We are very pleased to announce that the Town of Golden Beach has earned an increase in its bond credit rating. In investment, the bond credit rating represents the credit worthiness of corporate or government bonds. The ratings are published by credit rating agencies and used by investment professionals to assess the likelihood the debt will be repaid. The Town's bond credit rating was upgraded from A3 to A2 which indicates that as an obligor, it has a strong capacity to meet its financial commitments. This has allowed us to explore the possibility of refinancing our bonds at a lower rate.

In November 2007, the citizens of Golden Beach voted to authorize the Town to issue \$14,500,000.00 in general obligation bonds for the purpose of financing various capital improvements in the Town. This included streetscape projects, traffic calming improvements, underground utilities, and landscaping and irrigation in public rights of way.

At our last Council meeting a resolution to refinance these bonds was passed. This will result in a savings to the Town of \$750,000. These savings can be used for current capital improvement projects. A new street lighting project, enhancement of our Beach Pavilion to include new bathrooms and showers, and canal maintenance are just a few of the upcoming projects planned.

Our Halloween event was a huge success as usual with hundreds of residents in attendance. Our Town sponsored events are a great way to meet your neighbors and to share in an evening of fun and food. We are also grateful for the residents who attended our annual Veterans' Day observance. We all owe a debt of gratitude to those men and women who so bravely served in the United States Armed Forces.

I'd like to wish everyone Happy Holidays and a healthy New Year. I am grateful to have served for the past 12 years and I look forward to continuing to serve the Town of Golden Beach.
















Scary Fairy Tale: Halloween



s we hurdle towards the holidays we are breathing a sigh of relief as an uneventful hurricane season comes to a close. The past few months have been busy ones for the Department with

members of the force consistently getting involved with new and innovative ideas to network with our residents. We pride ourselves on our community relations. Members of the Golden Beach Police Department are readily accessible to our residents, either through daily "Park and Walk" details, mandatory "Watch Order", daily interactions, Beach Patrol or yearly events. We are constantly looking for ways to interact and get to know our residents and their needs, through organizing proactive community involvement, interface training, and showing accountability.



In the past months, the Police Department organized and/ or participated in the following community events:

• The "First Day of School" event was held in September. Children in Town received special Back-To-School goodie bags including pencils, pens, erasers, healthy snacks, and "just for fun" items such as "Be Smart Stay in School" wristbands and whistle toys.

- "National Night Out" was organized by our Police Department to inform the public about various police and community programs, drug prevention initiatives, Town watch organizations, and important crime-stopping tips, including how to burglar-proof your home. The Golden Beach Police Department took the opportunity to showcase much of their equipment and Town Officials were present to join the Police Department, in an effort to focus and engage in community policing efforts.
- On Sunday, September 25, 2016, the Police
 Department participated in the Town of
 Golden Beach's first 5K Run. Police Officers
 were assigned to different traffic posts along A1A
 and inside the town to ensure the runners' safety.
- In October, the Department presented "Red Ribbon Week," a drug prevention campaign that promotes awareness in combatting drug addiction and related crime, especially within the youth community. Red Ribbon Week provides an educational forum where residents not only get informational pamphlets about substance abuse, but they can also dispose of any expired medication, an often unseen danger hidden within the home. Once the medication is collected and impounded, it is taken by a Golden Beach Police Officer to a Miami-Dade Fire Station or Aventura Hospital for disposal or destruction.



• In addition to all of these programs and activities, I attended a National Security and Terrorism Conference & Workshop at the Greater Miami Jewish Federation. Staff members joined me at the International Association of Chief of Police (IACP) Conference in San Diego, California, where former Golden Beach Police Chief Don DeLucca was sworn in as the new president of the IACP. After serving as a board member for the last three years, he will now serve in his new position for the next year.

After a year of very vigorous preparation, our police department underwent an in-depth assessment by the Florida Police Accreditation Commission. On October 26, 2016, the Golden Beach Police Department was reaccredited by the Florida Police Accreditation Commission. This accomplishment is currently shared by only a handful of agencies in Northeast Dade and Southeast Broward. The Commission on Accreditation ensures that our police department and its members hold themselves to a higher standard of policing and that the agency is accountable in ensuring compliance. Our re-accreditation efforts was led by staff members, managed by Accreditation Manager Judith Jerome, with the support of Executive Assistant to the Chief Sheila Pirrone. For a lesser capable team this could have been a daunting task - but we are very pleased with our efforts and we hope the community will share in our recognition. I would like to thank the Mayor, Councilmembers, and Town Manager, for closely working with our staff and also approving every request and facilitating the needs of our Department assisting us to serve our community better.

Our Department continues to emphasize vigilance and proactivity. Our patrolling efforts do not stop inside the interior of the Town; we actively patrol the intracoastal waters and beach area. To further our police presence along the beach area of Town, I have ordered additional beach runs on the ocean side of Town. By utilizing the Town's closed circuit TV cameras combined with increased officer presence, residents can be assured the Golden Beach Police Department is being vigilant on keeping our residents safe.

I would also like to take a moment to honor Golden Beach Police Officer Christopher Lambert who passed away on September 17, 2016. Officer Lambert was a longtime member of the Golden Beach family, with whom I had the pleasure of working with since I started with the Town over five years ago. He was known as a dedicated officer as well as a friend to all. He will certainly be missed.

In closing I would like to remind residents that the Department has some exciting events coming up, including a "Movie Night." Look for updates via flyers, the Town's local access channel (channel 89) and the Police LED message board.

TOWN HONORS MEMORY OF OFFICER CHRISTOPHER LAMBERT

In September, family and friends gathered at the Beach Pavilion for a memorial service honoring Golden Beach Police Officer Christopher Lambert, who passed away after a brief illness.

Officer Lambert was a longtime member of the Golden Beach family, serving the Town for 11 years, and was known for being both dedicated to his duties and well-liked by anyone who crossed paths with him; during the holidays he would leave a greeting card with a scratch-off lottery ticket at the desk of every Town employee.

Friends, family members and fellow officers had no shortage of colorful stories to share about Officer Lambert. Mayor Singer and Councilmember Lusskin also spoke highly of him, as an officer for whom they had great professional admiration. The ceremony was punctuated with both laughter and tears, but was most of all a celebration of his life.

Town Manager Alexander Diaz closed the ceremony by taking to the police radio airwaves, announcing the retirement of Lambert's unit number in perpetuity, a powerful memorial and recognition of a man who will be deeply missed.

A special message from your Town Council:

First of all, we would like to thank the residents of Golden Beach for their continued confidence in our leadership and ability to do what is in the best for our community. As a team, we have completed multiple projects to help better life in Golden Beach. Recently we have helped shape the Town's new Landscape Ordinance to assure consistency of quality and beauty throughout Town. To add appeal, along with safety, we added bollards at the Strand entrance of Town; these poles help direct traffic and add a level of finish to the Town's main entrance. As an effort to protect our residents from a potentially serious health emergency, we enacted a swift and decisive plan to eradicate the possibility of Zika mosquitos breeding in Town. Part of our antimosquito efforts addressed proper drainage, the curbs and gutters project, a \$300,000 initiative, helped combat areas of standing water along with controlling localized flooding. This past year we offered brand new initiatives for residents, including a free self-defense clinic, hosted by the Golden Beach Youth Leadership Group.

In the 2015-2016 year alone we heard and approved over 30 Town Resolutions, relating to policy, administration, purchasing, and other legislative acts. Under our tenure we approved exclusive use of John Tweddle Park for use of Town residents and their guests, making the use of the Town's newly renovated tennis courts, basketball courts and playground a perk available only to those living in Golden Beach and their accompanied guests. As a way to bolster our Town's police force we approved adding an additional Police Canine (K-9). To help alleviate flooding and assist drainage we approved a proposal from Southeastern Engineering to work on the Outfalls on Center Island. Adding a little summer fun to our Town's Beach Pavilion we offered residents complimentary food and drinks every other weekend for the months of August and September. In keeping the Town's finances as one of our top priorities, we were also able to upgrade the Town's rating with Moody's Investors Service, no small feat as Golden Beach is the smallest municipality that Moody's rates. We are excited as to what the future holds for the Town of Golden Beach.

In closing we would like to thank you again for your support. We look forward to continuing to service residents and their families in the coming years.






Mayor Glenn Singer

Mayor Glenn Singer was first elected to the Town Council in 2001 and subsequently elected for his first term as Mayor in 2005. He has placed the successful growth and development of his community among his highest priorities. Mayor Singer's many accomplishments throughout his administration, includes the implementation of a Marine Patrol, the establishment of the Town's canine park, overseeing the Town's purchase of two vacant lots that were subsequently earmarked for green space, renovation of the Town's Police Substation, and more recently the Town's historic Beach Pavilion. Both renovation projects were completed on time and were within the established budgets. The Town also replaced two of its three bridges.





Councilmember Bernard Einstein is the longest sitting Councilmember, having first been elected to the Town Council in February 1999. He has also served on the Town's General Employees' Pension Board. Mr. Einstein has been a practicing member of the Florida Bar since 1978 and specializes in real estate transactions, title insurance, wills, trusts, and estates.





Councilmember Judy Lusskin

Councilmember Judy Lusskin was first elected to the Town Council in 2005 and is currently serving her 3rd term. Councilmember Lusskin was Program Director for the Michael-Ann Russell Jewish Community Center for 15 years where she was responsible for a multitude of programs, from infant day care to teen programming. She founded the Golden Beach Youth Leadership Group, Co-Chaired the Town's Anniversary Celebration committee, and has been an active member of several of the Town's advisory boards and committees. In addition Councilmember Lusskin is the Town's representative on the North Dade Transportation Board and is the Town's Representative to the Miami Dade League of Cities.









Councilmember Amy Isackson-Rojas

Councilmember Amy Isackson-Rojas was born in Bay City, Michigan. She is a 1988 graduate of the University of Miami Law School and is currently an active member of the Florida Bar. From 1989 to 1991, she was a Judicial Law Clerk at the Third District Court of Appeals. Since that time, she has served as an Assistant District Counsel for the United States Department of Homeland Security, Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

She and her husband, Tony, have lived in the Town of Golden Beach since 1991. They have twin sons, Jason and Jeremy. Prior to joining the Town Council, she was a member of the Security Committee, and she is currently a member of the Comprehensive Planning Board.

Code Enforcement: Rentals and Transient Living

Good neighbors make for good neighborhoods; that's something we can all agree on. Golden Beach prides itself on being an amazing place to live and there are certain ordinances that have been put in place to protect the integrity of our community. One of those ordinances is Ordinance 476.03 Section 66-91 which prohibits transient use of a residential dwelling within the Town's limits.

This ordinance pertains to regulating leasing or occupying residences in Town. Should you be an owner or if your property is owned by a corporation, and you wish to rent out your property within the Town be it by entering a verbal, written lease, rental agreement or simply allowing someone to live in your home, there are steps that must be taken to register with the Town.

It is important to note that Town ordinances strictly prohibit renting properties for less than six months consecutively.

The Transient Living Application is available through the Town's Code Enforcement Department or by accessing the Town's website www.goldenbeach.us. A check for \$125.00 must accompany the completed application. Unregistered renters leave owners open to code citations and fines. Having registered tenants keeps our community a safer and better place for everyone to live. Please be sure to follow all correct avenues should you plan on renting your home. If you need further assistance you may contact the Code Enforcement Department at Town Hall at 305-932-0744.

Sea Turtle Season Concludes, Special Thanks to Residents

Mark Chibis of the Sea Turtle Rescue Program recently contacted Town Hall and would like to extend a note of thanks to Town residents who have helped make sea turtles safer on our beaches.

This year alone, there were 56 marked nests, 4 additional nests that were discovered later and 5 nests that were transplanted to help ensure safety of hatchlings. With that final tally we can approximate that Golden Beach hosted 65 nests this year with an average of 110 eggs per nest. If that is true, then that gives us a total of more than 7,000 eggs. Recognizing that for many reasons, all of the eggs in each nest do not always hatch. And it is not uncommon for only 50-75% of the eggs to become fully developed. But even taking those factors into account, when the final amounts are considered, we hope that we will be able to say that Golden Beach was able to help between 3,500 and 5,000 new sea turtles. We hope the hatchlings we save today will one day return to lay their own nests, and your efforts have helped to make that a possibility. Zika Virus Updates

The Town has renewed its contract with Clarke, a mosquito control service provider, which will include monthly spraying Town-wide during the months of June through September. Clarke has also supplied the Town with some important facts on how to help keep your yard mosquito-free from the Aedes aegypti and Aedes albopictus mosquitos - breeds that are known to be carriers of the Zika virus.

These mosquitos can lay eggs in items as small as an overturned bottle cap! They need a minimal amount of standing water to lay their eggs, so check your yard for any place water can collect; Don't forget about little items like flower pots, pet food bowls, gutters, bird baths, watering cans, etc.

These breeds of mosquitos have atypical feeding patterns. They tend to bite during the day, unlike many other breeds of mosquitos that feed after the sun has set.

Being proactive about your property protects you most of all. Aedes mosquitos tend to bite close to their breeding grounds, so allowing them to breed on your property increases your risk of being bitten.

Town of Golden Beach combate el Zika

El virus Zika ha revolucionado al Sur de la Florida. Miami, específicamente Wynwood –El Art District – y Miami Beach, ha sido el punto geográfico con casos registrados. La presencia de esta enfermedad, que afecta principalmente la salud de mujeres embarazadas, nos obliga a educarnos sobre qué es y cómo afecta nuestra cotidianidad, así como a emprender acciones en nuestros hogares y comunidades que nos permitan combatirlo y así evitar su propagación.

El Departamento de Salud de la Florida advierte que no todos los mosquitos portan los mismos virus. Ellos actúan de diferentes maneras y en horarios diferentes. La manera más efectiva de combatir sus picaduras es usar repelentes cuando usted se encuentre en exteriores. Es importante que al usarlos siga cuidadosamente las instrucciones, no lo riegue sobre la piel debajo de la ropa, si usa protector solar coloque el repelente después de este producto.

En Golden Beach seguimos combatiendo la aparición del virus del Zika pero es de vital importancia que nuestros residentes emprendan acciones personales y familiares para evitar su propagación. Debemos evitar aguas estancadas y expuestas al aire libre. Por ello nuestras cuadrillas de limpieza se mantienen desplegadas por la ciudad para mantener limpias y secas nuestras calles, así como por las lluvias frecuentes que se registran en esta época del año.

Según la World Health Organization (WHO), el Zika es causado por la picadura del mosquito Aedes infectado y sus principales síntomas son fiebre leve, sarpullidos, conjuntivitis y dolores musculares. Aunque el virus fue aislado por primera vez en Zika (Uganda, África) en 1947, no fue sino hasta 2014 que se comenzó a escuchar sobre él cuando apareció el primer caso en el continente en la Isla de Pascua (Chile). Luego Brasil y así sucesivamente en otras regiones de la región americana.

La WHO advierte que solo una de cada cuatro personas contagiadas revela los síntomas, principalmente la fiebre leve y lo zarpullidos, acompañados ocasionalmente por conjuntivitis, dolores musculares o articulares y malestar general. El virus es muy parecido al dengue o al chikungunya —transmitidos por el mismo mosquito— y su vía de contagio no es solo la picadura del Aedes, si no otras como por transfusión de sangre y contacto sexual, de allí que las mujeres embarazadas se convierten en una de las principales afectadas por la enfermedad.

La WHO tiene cada vez más evidencias de que el virus puede ser transmitido de la madre al bebé durante la gestación. Una de las principales consecuencias en el niño es la microcefalia. Se recomienda a las mujeres embarazadas evitar viajar o residir en zonas donde haya casos registrados de Zika, así como mantener relaciones sexuales seguras con sus parejas en caso de que éstos estén potencialmente expuestos al virus. Tomando en cuenta que no todos los afectados presentan los síntomas es aconsejable que las mujeres en estado de gestación acudan puntualmente a sus controles prenatales con el médico.

Si usted presenta algunos de los síntomas mencionados en este artículo debe principalmente acudir al especialista e iniciar de inmediato un reposo que le permita aliviar el dolor la fiebre o cualquier otro indicio de la enfermedad. Es fundamental tomar abundante agua para evitar la deshidratación producto de la fiebre.

Debemos entender que no existe una vacuna o una medicina específica para el tratamiento del Zika, por lo que la World Health Organization señala las siguientes indicaciones que le compartiremos a continuación para evitar su contagio y propagación:

- Evite los criaderos de los mosquitos: El agua en recipientes destapados como macetas, tobos, botellas, o cualquier otro tipo de envases son focos idóneos para la reproducción del Aedes. En caso que deba acumular agua por alguna razón asegúrese de mantenerla tapada.
- No acumule basura y dispóngala en bolsas bien selladas y en sitios destinados para tal fin.
- Instale mayas y mosquiteros en las ventanas de su hogar para así evitar la entrada de algún mosquito infectado.
- Si se encuentra en una zona con casos conocidos de Zika utilice ropa que le cubra los brazos y las piernas, así disminuirá la posibilidad de ser picado por el mosquito.

• El uso de repelentes autorizados por los entes de salud responsables de su comunidad es una buena manera de mantener a raya al Aedes.

La presencia del virus del Zika en Miami Dade ha traido consecuencias nefastas no solo para la salud de sus residentes, sino que también han afectado la economía de zonas turísticas tan importantes para el condado como Wynwood y Miami Beach, puntos permanentemente visitados por turistas de todas partes del mundo.

La noticia sobre el Zika inicialmente en Wynwood paralizó la economía de la zona y ocasionó que miles de visitantes diarios evitaran ir a la zona para evadir cualquier riesgo de contagio. Sin embargo, los dueños de las tiendas y restaurantes de la zona se organizaron magistralmente para proporcionar seguridad a sus clientes, proveyéndolos de repelentes e implementando medidas de seguridad que permitan mantener el área libre de mosquitos infectados o posibles criaderos.

Igual ocurrió en Miami Beach, ciudad en las que las autoridades han estado ejecutando fumigaciones por tierra y aire, así como el emprendimiento de una campaña educativa que permita empoderar a los residentes de la zona sobre los conocimientos necesarios para combatir el virus.

Tenemos que entender que el principal aliado en el avance del Zika es la desinformación de todos los que habitamos en la ciudad, porque en la medida que todos emprendamos medidas pertinentes y oportunas para frenar su propagación más cerca estaremos de eliminar el virus de Miami.

Este 2016, el Janucá comenzará al atardecer del sábado 24 de diciembre y se extenderá hasta la noche del domingo 1 de enero de 2017. La tradición indica que cada vela debe encenderse cada día e ir sumándose hasta que todo el Menorá quedé encendido al final de la celebración.

Como ya es tradición para las familias, cada 24 de diciembre es un momento especial para celebrar un banquete, cuyo contenido varía dependiendo de la procedencia de cada quien, pero que sin duda es de lo mejor de cada gastronomía, debido a la relevancia de la celebración y porque es una de las fechas elegidas para reencontrarse con toda la familia.



Important Announcement Regarding Town's Finances

The Town received exciting news in November. Prestigious Investor Service Moody's upgraded the Town's collective credit rating to Aa2 from Aa3. The upgrade came as a result of the Town's expanding tax base and being situated within the larger growing Miami (Aa3 positive) and Fort Lauderdale (Aa1 stable) economies, along with the Town's manageable debt burden and pension profile, as well as its stabilized financial position despite unconventional accounting and budgeting practices.

The Town's affluence combined with strict development codes, manageable debt burden to tax value ratio, and a favorable pension profile were also seen as credit strengths. Its position could climb even further; increased reserves maintained at higher levels, reduction of debt burden and faster amortization rate and restoration of adequate balance levels in individual funds outside the General Fund could all be factors in boosting the Town's credit rating to an even higher level. With the Aa2 score the Town now qualifies for better rates on loans, allowing for future projects to come in at significantly lower final costs due to lower interest obligations.

Congrats to the Mayor, Town Council and Town Staff for their efforts to make this achievement possible!



Town Garners Prestigious Budget Award

The Town of Golden Beach is proud to announce that for the seventh year in a row the Town has received recognition for its budget. The barometer of a successful budget is set by the General Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). The Association commended the Town once again this year for its work on the 2015-2016 budget. A GFOA approved budget is a major accomplishment for the Town, especially for seven years running. Congratulations to the Town Hall staff for all their hard work in compiling the Town's budget book.



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
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
