Letter FROM THE MAYOR

s we move towards the end of the current fiscal year, we are exceptionally pleased that our assessed property values have gone up from \$939 million to \$1.03 billion. This is due

largely to the recent capital improvements and new construction. It takes a concerted effort between the Council, Town staff and our residents to maintain the high quality of life here in Golden Beach.

We will begin renovations and upgrades of our Police substation/guardhouse and our Beach Pavilion in the next few weeks. The plan is to improve the aesthetic value of the main entrance into Town and the accessibility of our Beach facilities. We are also working on finalizing our lighting project options. We have looked at several options and will be making a final decision very soon.

We continue to monitor the mosquito issue. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Florida Department of Health, as of August 10, 2017, there have been no local cases of Zika reported. Although we can breathe a little easier, it does not mean that we stop taking the necessary precautions. Remember to continue monitoring and removing standing water as we are still experiencing significant rain events. Also use protective clothing and repellent while outdoors. The Town will continue to utilize Clarke Mosquito Management for weekly treatments to prevent any mosquito infestation. Any questions, feel free to contact Town Hall.

It is my hope that you have had a safe and enjoyable summer. To our new residents, welcome. If you have traveled this summer, welcome back. We continue to dedicate all of our efforts to providing exceptional services to the residents of the Town of Golden Beach.

With August winding down that means schools in South Florida are back in session. Please be sure to keep an eye out for some of Golden Beach's smaller residents as they make their commutes to and from school. We've gathered some reminders for both drivers and kids to consider before heading out.

For Drivers:

- Limit distractions while driving. Texting and phone calls can cause carelessness and could result in an accident.
- Slow Down, especially during the hours children are heading to and from school. Sometimes we are running late in the mornings, but slowing down and paying attention can prevent a serious accident from occurring.
- Be aware. Watch for children on and along the road, driveways, near parks, and bus stops. Assume a child near the road, could be in the road within moments. Whether on bike or on foot, children can quickly dart into the road without notice.

For the Kids:

- **Use sidewalks**, they're safer than being in the street.
- Be sure to cross at intersections.
- Make sure to look both ways before crossing the street. Remember that drivers may not see you, so never walk in front of an approaching car. Walk your bike across intersections, it allows you more control if a car is coming and it gives drivers a chance to see you and stop.

That is why it's even more important for us to remind our kids of the importance of safety. We must stress to them the fact that it's much safer to travel with someone than to go anywhere alone. It's been proven that the buddy system can be very



beneficial for children traveling to and from school. Younger kids are especially at risk in traffic situations, as they eagerly seek to explore the many adventures that await them and their bicycles. If we make sure that they develop safe and defensive cycling skills, wear proper protective gear, and learn to pay attention to the rules-of-theroad, many accidents can often be avoided. Let us also remember to routinely run safety checks on all parts (brakes, mirrors, pedals, tires, chain etc.) of our kids' bicycles.



The Town would like to recognize the recent passing of James R. Robinson, a longtime property manager in Golden Beach. He was well known to many of the Town's residents and staff; he will certainly be missed. The following passage was submitted by Town resident Richard Lasry.

People from all walks of life could relate and appreciate his caring character. He was righteous, G-d fearing, proud, and humble; he had all the attributes that a hero is made out of.

UNDERWAY AT THE STRAND AND BEACH PAVILION

The Mayor and Town Council recently approved updates to The Strand Gatehouse and renovations to the Beach Pavilion area. The projects break ground in the coming weeks and will continue over the next few months. The Gatehouse will operate as usual; though the Beach Pavilion will close while construction is underway (beach access at the Pavilion will not be affected).

The Gatehouse will get a modern, more streamlined look, reflecting the contemporary designs of new homes appearing within Town. The Beach Pavilion area will undergo renovations, adding luxurious new outdoor showers, completely overhauled restroom areas, as well as a reimagining of the outdoor lounge area. Landscape Frigation RESTRICTIONS

Miami-Dade County

Existing Landscaping:

- Watering is NOT allowed between 10 AM and 4PM
- Residents with ODD numbered addresses may water lawns and landscaping on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 12AM to 10AM and/or 4PM to 11:59PM
- Residents with EVEN numbered addresses may water lawns and landscaping on Thursdays and Sundays from 12AM to 10AM and/or 4PM to 11:59PM

New Landscaping/Sod:

 Water regulations for New Landscaping and Sod fluctuate depending on age and specifics of Landscaping. Please consult South Florida Water Management District website for full details at www.sfwmd.gov

Avoid Code Citations: DID YOU KNOW?

Grass over 6" is a violation of Town Code with a \$150 fine for the first offense (multiple offenses result in increased penalties). Keep your lawn maintained to help keep Golden Beach looking its best while avoiding costly code citations.

Get Outta Here: SOUTH GATE WILL NOW ALLOW EXITING

Recognizing residents' requests for a speedier way to exit Town, the Mayor and Town Council recently approved a plan that will allow residents to leave Town through the South Gate. Clarke Environmental Mosquito Management has been contracted to provide mosquito management services to the Town of Golden Beach. They will actively address any mosquito-related issues in the Town through October 2017. This will include community-wide truck ULV treatments, barrier treatments for our parks and beach/pavilion, and treatments of our catch basins, inlets, and manholes.

Truck ULV treatments (fogging/spraying) will take place weekly on Wednesday mornings from 5:00 – 6:00 A.M. Following this, Clarke will then conduct the barrier treatments. All treatments shall be completed and Clarke employees will have left Town no later than 9:00 A.M.

Town Hall also has bottles of OFF mosquito repellant spray; residents wishing to collect a bottle may stop by Town Hall.


Please Donate CLOTHING AND HOUSEHOLD GOODS FOR BREAST CANCER

As the summer vacation comes to an end it is important for parents to go over some vital back-to-school information with their children. Here are 5 easy steps to make sure your children know the dangers of strangers.

STEP 1: HAVE THE TALK EARLY ON

Talking to your children about Stranger Danger is a critical part of their development. If you make a point to remind them every day before school, "don't talk to strangers," the information becomes ingrained in them.

STEP 2: CLEARLY DEFINE WHO IS A "STRANGER"

The best way to define a stranger to your child is stating that "a stranger is anyone unfamiliar to you." Make it clear that strangers can be nice and friendly, but they are still strangers. Be sure to make them aware of suspicious adult behavior. This includes asking to look for a lost puppy or offering candy if you follow them.

STEP 3: USE DIFFERENT METHODS TO PRACTICE THE DO'S AND DON'TS

There are many different ways to help your child be prepared should they ever be caught in an unsafe situation. Some of these methods include:

Family Code Words: In the event that you do have to have someone else pick up your child they should be able to say a code word to your child so they know that you did in fact send them.

Role-Play: Go over how your child should respond to certain scenarios. For instance, ask them what they would do if a stranger in a car pulled up next to them and asked to give them a ride home. They should know to say no and if need be, to run in the opposite direction the car is going as they will have more time to get further away because the car would have to turn around.

Differentiate between safe and unsafe strangers: Your child should be aware that police officers can be trusted. Strangers asking for you to get into their car or offering them candy or toys are not to be trusted.

Rules when home alone: Make sure you go over who, if anyone, they are allowed to open the door to, as well as who they are allowed to speak to on the phone.

Secrets that shouldn't be kept: "Body Secrets" should never be kept. Be sure to let your child know that they should not be ashamed if someone touches them; it is not okay for someone to touch them, and that they should tell you or a teacher immediately.

STEP 4: BE DIRECT

In many cases, parents feel that their children are too young to comprehend what needs to be known about "stranger danger." The reality is that it should be an ongoing conversation. You shouldn't withhold any information due to worry of scaring your children. It is so much better to be safe than sorry. As said before, there should be a repetition of information. The saying "don't talk to strangers" should always be fresh in their minds, not just something they were told on the first day of school.

It is important to take precautionary measures when dealing with the safety of your children. The fact of the matter is, there are legitimate dangers out there. Do the most you can to protect your family and prevent a tragedy.



Second Annual GOLDEN BEACH 5K

On September 17th, the Town will be hosting the second annual 5k run and we want you to be there! Don't run? That's OK! Feel free to walk, it's your participation that counts. Founder and creator of the 5k, Alan Wolfson believes it is perfect way to bring a sense of community to both Golden Beach residents and employees. Working with the Golden Beach Leadership Group (GBLG), they decided to have the proceeds go to a Florida enrichment program known as Best Buddies.

This organization was founded in 1989, becoming America's first national, unified, social, and recreational program for people with intellectual disabilities. Since then, it has been represented in 212 elementary, middle, and high schools and on college campuses across Florida where it has matched 65 adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities in one-to-one friendships in the Citizens programs in Central and South Florida.

The run will begin promptly at 7:30am at Town Hall, where runners who registered by September 5th will get their shirts, then continue North along Golden Beach Drive to Massini Avenue where it will loop back and end at Town Hall. Upon completion, runners and walkers will be offered food catered by Moe's Southwest Grill and Whole Foods. Plenty of water will also be provided at mile markers one and two. Volunteers to hand out food and drinks during and after the run are needed and appreciated. For more information on volunteering contact Destiny Camacho at (305)-932-0744.

Mosquitoes and Construction Sites

Disease-spreading mosquitoes can breed in nearly any container that holds water. This can include items around a construction site, such as water-filled jersey barriers, concrete floors, construction dumpsters, drums, five-gallon buckets, plastic litter, empty cans and bottles, plumbing and duct banks, elevator vaults and the like.

If you manage a construction site, here's how you can reduce mosquitoes at your site:

WATER-FILLED CONSTRUCTION BARRIERS

Water-filled construction barriers can breed mosquitoes. Even when empty, rainwater can enter through cracks or an open drain plug. Here's how to keep them from breeding mosquitoes:

- Treat them with a commercially available mosquito larvicide that contains Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis), methoprene, or larviciding oil.
- Cover and seal barriers properly, replace damaged barriers.

CONSTRUCTION DUMPSTER

Mosquitoes take about one week to go from egg to adult. Have your construction dumpster emptied at least once per week to break up the mosquito life cycle. Additionally, treat dumpsters with a commercially available larvicide (see above).

FIVE-GALLON BUCKETS, PLUMBING AND DUCT BANKS, AND OTHER SMALL CONTAINERS

Here's how to keep these items from breeding mosquitoes:

- Remove any unnecessary containers such as buckets; for containers you do need, either turn them upside down or store them where they can't fill up with rainwater.
- Discard or eliminate old bathtubs, sinks, toilets, or other plumbing fixtures. If you need to keep them onsite, cover them or store them where they can't fill up with rainwater.
- Keep building materials and supplies off the ground and positioned in such a way as to avoid creating areas of standing water and areas that are inaccessible for treatment.
 - Seal duct banks and keep shower, spa, and pool areas free of water.

CANS, BOTTLES AND OTHER

FOOD AND BEVERAGE CONTAINERS

Provide workers with a container or bag for proper disposal of cans, bottles and food or beverage containers when they're done.

Mosquitoes can lay eggs in an item as small as a bottle cap from a water or soda bottle.

- Keep work areas in workmanlike order.
 - Treat elevator vaults with a commercially available larvicide (see above).

PROTECT YOUR

WORKERS FROM MOSQUITO BITES

Make sure workers wear long sleeves, long pants and socks, and put on mosquito repellent.


